

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This marks my fifth year as the Southeast Nebraska Development District's (SENDD) executive director and 2022 might have been our busiest since I arrived in 2017. As one might expect, most of our attention remained focused on flood recovery and COVID-19 response activities, but on top of these efforts, we attended a lot of community meetings and assisted with even more grant applications. There were times when it seemed we met ourselves coming in the door as we left for another community meeting, but that outreach is the reason behind SENDD's ongoing success.

I was brought up to be humble, but I do want to set that aside for a moment to brag on SENDD's Board of Directors and staff. The Board has trusted this development district to break the mold and and try some truly out of the box ideas. For example

the Board gave us permission to contact a start-up tech company to explore crowdsourced, broadband mapping. That confidence translated to a nationally-recognized statewide broadband mapping project that included over 14,000 participants. Along these same lines, the Board's faith let staff utilize grant funds to strengthen relationships with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's (UNL) Community and Regional Planning (CRP) program to create downtown revitalization plans for member communities as well as a regional food systems analysis. Similarly, SENDD staff contributed substantially to the State of Nebraska's successful Digital Equity grant. But these examples are just a glimpse of what is in store for the coming year. We are currently working on a few projects that may change how smaller communities can address economic development as well as a program that can bring broadband into income-qualified homes.

Once again, much of this innovation can be attributed to the SENDD Board, but the concepts come from listening to our member communities. If it were not for ideas generated in village board or city council meetings, these novel approaches would never materialize. So, thanks to each of you who continue to contribute ideas or provide feedback on areas to improve.

I am hopeful that SENDD continues to push the boundaries of innovation. We could certainly not do this without your support. As always, I want to extend an open invitation for all members to visit SENDD's offices when you are in Lincoln or Auburn. I encourage each of you to call me with your ideas, suggestions, and thoughts.





Between SENDD and SEND, Inc., there are currently five revolving loan funds between the two organizations that currently has approximately



### **HOUSING GRANTS**






# **PROJECT SPOTLIGHTS**

#### **Rural Workforce Housing: 800 Scott St, Beatrice**

In April 2021, Southeast Nebraska Development, Inc. loaned \$100,600 to Rehab Junkies, a developer in Beatrice, NE. The house, located at 800 Scott St had sat vacant for years. The only thing living in it was a raccoon! The developers reconfigured the entire main floor.

They planned to sell the house for around \$160,000 but it sold for \$195,000. The house was staged to help expedite the sale of the house; the buyer loved so much of it that she wanted to purchase most of it and was part of the final sale price.

# **PROJECT SPOTLIGHTS**

#### **Rural Workforce Housing: 621 Neal Street**

This project kicked off in February 2022 and was completed in August 2022. Southeast Nebraska Development, Inc. partnered with SENDD Contracting to bring life back into this historic home to become a place to call home for a young family moving to Peru. The property had sat vacant for decades and was in desperate need of repair. This was a significant undertaking as the house was completely remodeled, restoring it back to its glory days. The house was purchased for \$72,000 and sold for \$220,000. This project is a stepping stone in providing much-needed housing in the City of Peru.




# SPOTLIGHTS CTD.

#### BROADBAND

Across the SENDD membership area, communities are becoming more involved in the broadband expansion process. Seward County and Thayer County have established Broadband Action Teams, empowering their representatives to issue and review Requests for Information, negotiate with internet service providers, and support quality grant applications. In September,

Gage County finalized a groundbreaking multimillion-dollar public-private partnership with Nextlink Internet that will bring affordable fiber optic connectivity to nearly 1,000 rural households in the next two years. Nearly \$15 million in State Broadband Bridge grants and County ARPA funds were invested in broadband deployment projects in SENDD member counties in 2022.

#### **BROADBAND SUMMIT**

In March 2022, SENDD, along with seven other economic development districts, hosted a statewide broadband summit at various locations across the state. The goal of the summit was to inform key stakeholders about the importance of broadband and why community representatives need to increase broadband initiatives for both access and digital equity. SENDD's host site was

attended by representatives from state agencies who are spearheading the efforts for broadband expansion and digital equity; SENDD was able to partner with these representatives to shape the approach in accessing funding that was being allocated by the federal government. SENDD provided the template for the state's digital equity plan that was submitted by the state in its request for funds in July, where SENDD's broadband fellows were invited



to attend a broadband conference along with other representatives from the state in Kansas City to learn how to most effectively create and implement digital equity plans. SENDD has since been working closely with state officials and other EDD's to ensure local organizations and internet providers are at the forefront of improving digital equity for not only our region but the state as a whole. In addition, that broadband dollars are spent in the most effective way to better serve residents and businesses alike.

# SPOTLIGHTS CTD.

#### **REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT LITE PROGRAM**

In June 2022, SENDD started working with Chrisman Consulting, Civic Nebraska, and Winning Solutions, Inc. to prepare a Regional SENDD Economic Development Program (funded by a CARES grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA)) featuring curriculum and а comprehensive toolkit for communities to utilize to strengthen their economic development efforts and complement the work economic development professionals are doing. Throughout the course of the creation of the program, SENDD decided to incorporate Food Systems into the program and included New Ventures Advisors and University of Nebraska at Lincoln (UNL) to focus on food systems and food security and how it relates to economic development. The program is currently in the digital phase and should be available by the fall of 2023. Interested in participating in this program? Contact our office today for more information.




